DATA STEEL WINS THE SWISS TEAMS EVENT

At the end of the 3rd day's play in the 1st Mind Sports National Championship, organised by the "Mindsports Association of Pakistan" at the Southend Club, Karachi, the SWISS TEAMS event came to an end.

At the completion of 15 rounds in the SWISS TEAMS of the Bridge event, the **DATA STEEL** team comprising of Tariq Rashid, Rashid-ul-Ghazi, Pervez Mirza, Hasan Jawad, Tehsin Gheewala, with a score of 264 VPs led their nearest rival by 2 VPs to win the event. Team CANDYLAND, which for most of the rounds were on the leader board had to be content with the 2nd place with a score of 262 VPs. The team was represented by Hasan Askari, Mohd. Ismail, Ziaullah Beg, Hamid Mohiuddin, Khalid Mohiuddin and Mubashir Puri. LUMS, the team which is going to represent Pakistan at the World Mind Sports games at Beijing were in 3rd position with 260 VPs and Hadi with 259 were on 4th position. *See detailed results on page 2.*




North opened a weak two in diamond and South with 21 HCPs showed his heart suit. North preferred bidding 3H with his doubleton (may be 2NT would have shown the hand better) and hence the final contract became 4H rather than the normal 3NT.

West led the ♠5 and the declarer was lucky to make the contract when hearts broke 3-3. Then also they had to lose 2 IMPs, when their opponents in the open room scored 12 tricks in 3NT





South led the \$5 and declarer won in dummy with the Ace and played the singleton heart, North hopping up with the Ace and returning a low diamond. South won with the Ten and returned the \$9. Declarer gave a spade trick and declarer made 10 tricks for 130. In the open room, Allana's team went 1 down in 5 Clubs doubled and gave -100 for a 6 IMPs pickup to Data Steel.



The sacrifice in club contract, which went 2 down for 500 fetched the Allana team 4 IMPs, as even Five spades contract was cold. Opponents bid and made 4 Spades in the open room.

Board 4 was a flat board, both team scoring 650 in 4H contract.


1NT was 12-14 and 2D was game forcing Stayman. The lead was ♥Q declarer winning in hand with the Ace and played the singleton spade to Queen and Ace. South returned the heart and declarer played the ♣J to queen and Ace. The trumps were taken out and declarer made 12 tricks for 420. In the open room, the easier contract of 3NT was played making 10 tricks for no swing.

The next board was a big swing in favour of Allana's team (see board on next page).



The gamble paid off, when West led the VQ. South quickly claimed the contract for +550. This was a big swing as contract goes 4 down on lead of spade

or diamond. Their partners took the 3NT contract 4 down and gained 200 in the open room for a nice 13 IMPs pickup.




There was no swing on the next board. In the closed room the contract of five clubs doubled went one down for -200.



Playing Lebensohl, should West bid 2NT or 3C on the West hand. With soft values, 2NT seems to be better and would have been a success in this case as they would have stopped below game. As the cards lie 5D contract is a far superior one and gets defeated only on an opening club lead. In the open room, Allana's team was in 4H, which went 2 down.




South tried a 3rd seat opening with his 4-card spade suit and West, who did not open a weak two in spade, got carried away. His 4D splinter forced opponents to be in 5D, which was doubled and would have gone for 300. But West took that out and got penalized for that when the contract went 2 down. In the open room, the contract was 4S going 1 down, giving 2 IMPs to Allana's team.

South showed a bigger hand but NS stopped at the right contract. They gained an IMP on the board, when their opponents scored 90 only.

Over East's 1NT (15-17), West bid 2D (transfer to Hearts) and 3H was super acceptance. West took his chances with bare 7 HCPs.

There were 2 clubs and a spade loser and declarer had to take a correct view in diamonds to make the contract. That was also not required, when declarer after taking out trumps and giving a spade, played the 3rd spade and when Queen fell, he was able to discard a diamond on the Jack of spades. The contract in the open room was 1NT making three and that gave a well earned 10 IMPs to Data Steel.

The final score line was 20-18 (16-14 VPs) in favour of Allana's team in a well fought match.






The 2H opening created a bit of problems for the EW pair, who bid a slam in dark. However, every thing turned out well for them and the contract was made when the spades broke 2-2. In the open room, their opponents played in a slightly better 6S contract, which again depended on spades breaking in favour. So there was no swing.

The next two boards were flat. On board 12,both teams bid 3NT making 10 tricks and on Board 13, both bid and made 1NT.



There seems to be only 5 losers, but because of the bad break in heart, the contract will go down 1. But on the table East played the •A and shifted to a club, declarer winning with Ace and playing the TOP 2 hearts. When heart did not break, he rolled the •9, losing to ten. West returned the diamond and East after winning with the ten played the •K, declarer throwing a small spade.

East continued with diamond queen, which was ruffed in dummy and *K played, which got ruffed. Dealer had to further give 2 spades and went 2 down for -100. Their opponents played in 1NT from South seat, which got duly made on a spade lead. It is interesting to note that on diamond lead, defenders can cash 4 diamonds and 4 spades and the contract should have gone 2 down. Hadi got 5 IMPs in the bargain.





West bid a well timed 2S (weak two in spade) with 5-carder (but solid suit). It had its effect when North could not re-bid over 3S. As the cards lie, even 5D seems to be cold. The contract went 2 down for -100 as there were 3 clubs, 2 diamonds and a heart loser, which could not be disposed off. In the open room, Hadi's team played in 2C making 10 tricks for +170 and a 2 IMP gain.




The lead was **\(\)**K and declarer won the trick in hand with Ace and played **\(\)**10 (bit strange, that he did not play the TOP diamonds taking the chance of queen falling. This may be because he wanted to play safe and he was only in 2NT). There were always 8 top tricks after this and that's what he made. In the open room, the contract was 3NT making 10 tricks (430) and a 7 IMP pickup for Hadi.

After the spade King lead, declarer after winning with Ace can play club and East seeing AJ in dummy, is bound to cover with honor card. As 9 falls from West, if declarer can play the Jack, he may even make 11 tricks, with the all important Jack of spade as entry in dummy. The board costed




Well some one was at fault here, when rather than playing in the optimum 2S, EW played in 3D on a 5-2 fit and that also with a poor suit. East surely has a problem over 2H. He could have bid 2S as partner will at least have 3 spades. Afterwards he could have even corrected 3D to 3S (but he may have though partner to have good 5 or 6-carder in the bid suit and hence may have passed). The contract went 2 light and a +100 to UPCOMING team. In the open room, the UPCOMING team pair bid 2S and made for +110 and a 5 IMP pickup for their team.




(1) – 12-14, (2) – Capelleti (Single Suiter)

With 7-carder running heart suit and an Ace outside, it seemed to be a mis-utilization of Capelleti rather than utilization over a weak NT. DBL would have been more appropriate. After DBL, South can bid 3H over 2S, which would have given more clarity to partner. Partner was right in passing the 3H bid. When the club behaved 10 tricks were easily made for +170 to NS. In the open room, their partners bid 3S with EW cards going only 1 down for a 3 IMP gain.



Usually you upgrade a hand with 10 HCPs and a six card suit headed by the AK, but it turned out to be an excellent decision to pass 2NT. The lead was VJ, declarer winning with the queen and playing a low club to the 9. South won with the Ten and played back the heart, North winning the Ace and returning another heart to King. Now came the key play when declarer played the singleton spade, South was forced to take with Ace after spade call be West. That's what declarer wanted for his 8 tricks. In the open room, the contract was 3NT which went 1 down giving 6 IMPs to HADI team.



The last deal turned out to be the most exciting deals. I bet that with any 4-carder in minors, East would have bid 2S making South happy. But with a 5-3-3-2 distribution, East passed with 15 HCPs. The 2H bid by South (Transfer to Spades) was well doubled by West for Heart suit, but East was more than happy to pass North's 2S.

The lead was VJ and declarer won in hand with Ace and returned the V10, west winning with the queen. A diamond was returned and East scored his King, when declarer played low. Now if East plays a low spade, West would have 100% got his singleton Jack, but East preferred playing the TOP spades and exited with a diamond. Declarer can now make the contract as he can win in hand and go on playing diamonds, discarding a club. On the 4th diamond, if East ruffs, it can be over-ruffed and East can be thrown-in with the trumps to get both clubs for 8 tricks.

However declarer faltered in his play and cashed the Club Ace before playing diamonds and the endplay was broken. He went down 1 for -100. But the UPCOMING team gained 9 IMPs on the board, when their opponents bid 3S with NS cards and went 2 down in the doubled contract for -500.

The final score line was 20-17 (16-14 VPs) in favour of HADI's team in a well fought and interesting match.
